CCFA's mission is to cure Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis and to improve the quality of life of those affected by these diseases. All funds raised from HPHS will go to CCFA's Research Program for Youth. This research will make life better for kids with Crohn's, people in your classes at HPHS, and many more across the country.
